Start of 2018

- The continued increase in the size of the BE is placing pressure on especially the kitchen and the sanatorium, both of which are being monitored.
- The BE staff are also keeping an ongoing eye on the sizes of the boarding houses themselves, and are considering a few options on how best to manage and monitor the boys in the future, given the fact that international norms point to houses that are about 60 beds in extent.
