From the Headmaster's Desk

Dear Parents and Guardians

Your boys are in the midst of preparing for their very important mid year examinations and I thought it prudent to bring one or two matters to your attention at this juncture: the Senior Deputy, Mr Guise-Brown, who is in charge of discipline at College and myself, on two separate occasions last week addressed the boys on two anti-social issues; theft and graffiti, and I share aspects of those addresses with you.

Theft, together with graffiti, are two of the most testing "anti-social" problems that we have to deal with, and the handful of boys who are stealing are creating a great deal of tension for the majority of College boys.

Recently there has been a spate of items stolen and increased offensive graffiti in the ablutions, both of which are totally unacceptable, against the School Rules and Code of Conduct. Theft is a very serious problem in this country and Maritzburg College is not immune to this. Every day we read about corrupt politicians and leaders, businessmen, sportsmen etc. who have through illegal means helped themselves to money that did not belong to them. They of course are not being good role models for our youth.

There are parents in this community who are struggling financially to keep their sons at this school and want the best for their sons. When a cell phone is stolen, a basher disappears after been thrown in the air at rugby on Saturday afternoon, or a space case has to be replaced, a number of mothers and fathers have to make unnecessary financial sacrifices to simply keep it all together.

Every single boy must take greater responsibility if his own personal belongings. It is a sad state of affairs that at the age of 14 or 18 you have to become less trusting, when you should be able to trust everyone around you especially at a school in which one speaks of a brotherhood. But it is unfortunately the reality of the world that we live in. This means that under no circumstance can valuables be left lying around in a bag. Cell phones need to a switched off and kept on your person or locked in a locker. Bags, books and uniform items cannot be left lying around. These items will be collected by staff

and placed in lost property, announced to the school weekly to be collected, and otherwise will be handed over to the charity section of the school. ALL items need to be clearly marked with a boy's name and house. Uniform and other items will be checked sporadically by housemasters and mentors to ensure that everything is named. Items that do not belong to a pupil MUST be returned to their rightful owners asap otherwise that boy will face the consequences of what is ultimately theft. If a pupil is in possession of items of clothing etc that do not belong to him and without the owner's permission, then it is theft.

The question is what do we do if this pattern of theft continues? Do we resort to a number of harsh and extreme measures such as the following:

- Ban cell phones altogether from College as is the practice in some schools?
- Install cameras in every classroom and ablution so that College looks like a prison?
- Automatically expel a boy from the BE or suspend from the school for any act of theft, no matter how minor, for example the theft of a pen?

It was pleasing to see that many boys came forward last week and were prepared to give details of an incident where a boy was looking through the bags of other boys. They were prepared to write statements putting their names to those statements. They had had enough, and it was time to stand up and be counted. It did not matter that they were lower formers accusing a higher former of theft. They acted with INTEGRITY – one of our Core Values and did the right thing, breaking the so-called 'code of silence'. The boys were challenged to have a zero tolerance for theft and graffiti and to expose the offenders. One boy has since left the school and has a criminal charge against him.

Another matter is that core value of Honesty relating to work and assignments submitted for various subjects, which constitutes plagiarism. Plagiarism is defined as 'the taking of the work or the idea of someone else and passing it off as one's own without due acknowledgement'. High school teaches more than just basic subjects such as science or maths. It also teaches about ethical behaviour and how to be a responsible citizen; plagiarism is a form of academic cheating. At Maritzburg College we believe that plagiarism is a totally unacceptable practice and not in line with the values and standards that we set as a top academic institution. Ultimately boys caught plagiarising will receive a zero for the work submitted. We ask that you remind your sons about the need to be honest and do their own work.

In conclusion, in preparation for the exams may I draw your attention to the exam scopes and tips for improvement in specific subject areas which are on the Moodle and d6. The importance of exam revision using past papers and memos from the Moodle cannot be over-emphasised and is a key indicator in the success of top students.

Our careers focus evening is compulsory for all F3 and F5 tomorrow evening and would strongly advise that parents attend with their sons. The subject choice evening is next term and a letter regarding the requirements for taking Physical Science is on d6 and should be read.

Thank you for the support of your sons, the staff and the school.


