From the Head's Desk

Dear Parents and Guardians

In my message to you last week I mentioned that Maritzburg College has set school-wide goals for 2019;

- 1. To provide a foundation for College boys based on character education & our core values
- 2. To foster a growth mind-set amongst staff and pupils
- 3. To continually enhance effective and meaningful communication with all stake holders
- To continue to promote transformation and social awareness within the College Community

I would like to expand further on these and ask HOW do we fulfil these?

We will continue to focus on our Core Values throughout the year. Boys should strive to live by them at all times, and use them to make good choices while understanding the consequences of their actions. Respect is always a much debated topic and must work both ways and for staff and students, senior and junior.

What is a growth mindset? People believe that their most basic abilities can be developed through dedication and hard work; however brains and talent are just the starting point. A growth mindset means having a love of learning, and a resilience that is essential for great accomplishment. It is not now how good you are — it is how good you want to be.

Effective and meaningful communication works at all levels; teacher/pupil, coach/pupil, teacher/parent, SGB/parent community, verbally, electronically, face - to -face, verbal and non-verbally etc . How do we promote Transformation and Social Awareness? It's about being mindful of others and how they might feel when you say or do something hurtful. We need to practice mindfulness in our mind, body and soul. Practice mindfulness through positive thoughts and positive actions so that it becomes second nature.

A highlight on campus this week was the end of "Borver Week" and the special Tie ceremony held on Monday when our Form 2 boys received their ties from their House Leaders followed by their entry into the Alan Paton Hall for their Ist assembly as members of the College family. We have included some of these highlights later in this newsletter.

2019 will see the start of the Character Education mentorship programme begin on campus. I spoke to our boys about this and the importance of good character. The intelligence you were born with is important, but there are also other key factors that will help you succeed in life; essential ingredients include determination and grit, and the winning difference appears to be a mixture of motivation, perseverance and character – a determination to succeed. leadership curriculum in the Life Orientation syllabus, various practical leadership opportunities (mentoring, peer-tutors, camp leaders etc.), training seminars & workshops, evaluation of performance in leadership activities, and leadership aptitude testing.

Our leadership structure at Maritzburg College is made up of a Head Prefect and four Deputy Head Prefects, one of whom is Head of Boarding. This year we have 28 prefects in the school, each of whom has a portfolio that they oversee. There are 10 House Captains and 10 Vice House Captains. Also making up the leadership structure are 50 House Leaders. One major positive of the House Leaders structure is that it allows for more boys to experience leadership through the House Programme. Prefects and House Leaders play an important role in maintaining the College ethos.

Our main aim with the Leadership Programme is to teach the boys, and give them an opportunity to experience leadership in preparation for the real world.

Sporting Spotlight



There were strong sporting performances from Maritzburg College boys over the weekend. Highlights included the performances of our cricket, basketball and waterpolo teams in the first round of fixtures against Westville. With only a couple of days back at school, College's teams played with commitment, courage and determination.

Cricket

The Maritzburg College Ist XI Cricket side got their year off to a good start with a win at home against Westville. Batting first Westville were eventually bowled out in the 50th over for 209. D Dyer was the chief destroyer with 4/31. College's Ist XI won comfortably by 4 wickets with 4 overs to spare. There were also good results for a number of other teams, the 2^{nds} winning by 57 runs and the 3^{rds} by 207 runs. A summary of the matches against Westville shows College winning II of the 18 played, losing 6 and I match with no result.

Basketball

After a closely fought game, Westville Ist team were the winners with a score of 49-43 despite the College basketball boys showing true fighting spirit right up until the final whistle. Overall results were played 17, won 11, lost 5 and drew I – a good start to the year.

Waterpolo

College's waterpolo teams faced some tough competition from Westville. Our 1st team had a very good game with fantastic support from our boys, but lost to Westville 3-7. Overall the waterpolo teams won 3 of the matches played, losing 5 and 2 with no result.

Canoeing

With Dusi on our doorstep, a number of College boys took part in the weekend's 50 miler. Dave Evans had a great race finishing in 10th place and Scott Little in 21st place overall. Evans was also the 1st junior paddler home and Little the 3rd junior.

Squash

Our Squash team lost 3-5 to Westville at home.
