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
# **Academic Achievements**



### Focus on... Shikaya Workshop

As part of the school's Social Awareness programme, 20 Subject Heads of various subjects attended a curriculum workshop presented by Shikaya (Roy Hellenberg and Dylan Wray) on Friday. The over-arching theme for the workshop was Race & Membership in history and how this affects identity formation and educational spaces today. The presenters challenged teachers to face assumptions about race, as they were guided through the social construction of 'race' from a historical perspective. Shikaya used sources from various historical articles and the teachers engaged with these through various teaching techniques such as group discussion, 'Found Poetry' and 'popcorn reading' – all of which can be applied in the classroom as well. The feedback from teachers was overwhelmingly positive.



"We were reminded of the huge responsibility and privilege we have as teachers in shaping, changing, promoting and challenging ideals and values in a society, for the benefit of our community. We felt empowered by recognising our worth; and our impact in making our country a better place for EVERY learner," said Rodelle Govender, the Subject Head for English at Maritzburg College. Forget Easter - The King is risen!

It is difficult to get our minds around what it means to live as citizens of the Kingdom of God and how that, even though Jesus inaugurated God's Kingdom, we don't often feel it as part of our daily reality. It doesn't seem like God is the King over many of the circumstances in which we find ourselves. God reigns? Maybe. Things around us seem way too broken for that to feel right.

But Jesus defines kingship in a new way: 'And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself (John 12.32). King Jesus was exalted on a throne that was hewn from rough timber. His crown was handcrafted from thorns, his royal entourage was two thieves and he 'drew all people' with outstretched arms that were held to a cross by Roman spikes. His kingly chamber was a grave carved out of the side of a hill.

And in a violent, wicked death that no King deserved, this King ushered in a Kingdom that is fully available, but not yet fully experienced. We understand this as part of our South African story. As a nation we were declared free in 1994 to great celebration filled with hope for the future. But many don't fully experience the reality of that hard won freedom as they remain shackled to poverty. What was declared for all has not yet materialized for many. So we work, trying to bring that declaration fully to life on what appears to be a long and slow road.

We celebrated this King over the past special weekend. The victory He declared and paid for in full has not yet been realized for many. So we work, trying to bring--with the power of God's Spirit--that declaration fully to life on what appears to be a long and slow road. But final victory is assured. Easter is the victorious sign that this is so.
