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Academic Achievements

Focus on... Physical Science

Physical Science introduces boys to investigative thought processes, mathematical problems, abstract thought and advanced problem-solving. It has theoretical and practical components. This subject is comprised of both Chemistry and Physics. It covers a very broad range of topics within these two learning areas.

According to Subject Head Liesl Couperthwaite, second term is the panic term. We have to do Department of Education practicals which are often bulky and have errors in them. We also have a very tight schedule which is not helped by the many public holidays and other days which we miss lessons in.

In 6^{th} form we deal with some difficult work which is to a great extent intuitive, while 5^{th} and 4^{th} form meet the "Electricity Dragon".

Physical Science is an academically demanding subject. It requires a strong mathematical background, an enquiring mind, an ability for problem-solving and a rigorous work ethic. It is ideal for the academically able boy who has an interest in Chemistry and Physics. It is strongly advised that if a boy does not achieve a solid C for Maths at the end of Grade 9, then he should not choose this subject.

Focus on...Art

Recently, the Art Department held a screen-printing workshop with Khulekani Cele from the Centre for Visual Arts at UKZN. Khulekani is an experienced printer in all kinds of printing processes, and has great experience in teaching at a tertiary level. He gave a 3-hour short course where learners and teachers were able to learn how to create a two-colour print, and we were delighted with our results.





The Art Department hopes that boys will use screenprinting by itself or in combination with other techniques, to push their creative boundaries and explore other ways of making art.
