From the Headmaster's Desk

Dear Parents and Guardians

My message to our boys this week in line with our theme has been around the core value of SELF-DISCIPLINE

Self discipline means deliberately aligning our energy with our values and priorities. Martin Luther King Jr stated 'the time is always right to do what is right.' This statement relates directly to our core values and the self-discipline to implement those values. Through mental practice we focus in on a task before us and let other temptations and distractions pass us by. Self-discipline asks that we endure frustration, disappointment, and pain in the service of a higher goal. It means being willing to push ourselves to the limits of our will and endurance if that is what is needed for success. Self-discipline need not be harsh; it can take the form of a quiet resolve or determination that then directs our choices. It is exacting, but is rarely served by our being self-critical or self-denigrating [to belittle oneself]. Self-discipline allows us to make use of whatever power and capabilities have been given us, to be all that we can in the service of our dreams. By doing what's right without delay, you will feel right about yourself.

This can be applied in a College context by being self-disciplined in the manner in which boys approach their academic programme, co-curricular activities and personal life decisions. A number of boys have recently displayed very poor self-discipline in choices which will result in serious consequences These reckless decisions could have a severe impact on their future not only at College but in their adult life. We used to talk of 30 seconds of madness but it can now be as little as two or three seconds. I encourage our boys to support one another in the true sense of brotherhood by helping their friends to make good, sound choices and not poor, impulsive ones. Self-discipline is also needed now by our boys in focusing on midyear exams which are very important and need their best academic effort.

A number of our boys have displayed excellent self-discipline and commitment in their respective sporting codes and have worked exceptionally hard in their service to their school. S Ngcongo, our Ist XI goalie, has reached the significant milestone of 50 games for the RedArmy. TK Whiteman, 1st XI striker, has also reached a significant milestone of 50 games for the 1st soccer team. JS Shaw has been selected to present SA U16 Polocrosse team, and H Heeralal is ranked No I in SA at Karate U21 level. Our choir achieved gold in the Open Division for Boys at the ATKV Applous Competition this week. Congratulations to all these boys and their coaches.

Why Study the History of South Africa?

"With the historian it is an article of faith that knowledge of the past is a key to understanding the present." (Kenneth Stampp)

"Search in your past for what is good and beautiful. Build your future from there." (President Paul Kruger)

Mr Marwick and Mr Dutton attended the Schindler's List Workshop for educators at the Durban Holocaust & Genocide Centre on Friday, 17 May. The workshop focused on how applying the lessons of the film, Schindler's List, toward standing up to hatred in our own communities, and how to engage students in conversations around racism, antisemitism and other forms of hatred. To commemorate the 25th anniversary of Schindler's List, Universal Pictures has re-released the film internationally for a limited theatrical engagement. To accompany this re-release, Facing History and Ourselves have developed a new digital resource for teachers to use as a guide when using the film in the classroom. Highlights included: reflections from Schindler's list survivor Rena Finder; effective strategies to prepare students to be thoughtful, emotionally engaged viewers of the film; resources to provide historical context and lesson ideas to connect this historical moment to contemporary events.

Rugby

The weekend saw College play 15 rugby matches against DHS with some excellent results as the RedBlackWhite teams won 14 of their games, and lost just one. Overall our rugby boys played 28 games on the weekend, winning 26 and losing just 2. The 1st XV played a good game with the final score of 34-24 to Maritzburg College, which meant we regained the Skonk NIcholson Cup which has spent the last two years at DHS, a welcome addition to the College trophy cabinet.

Hockey
