## FROM THE HOUSEMASTER

The third term has a reputation for being a bit of a quieter term as the winter sports programme comes to a halt. However, this didn't seem to be the case this year. It has been a busy one with lots of activity and hard to believe that we are deep into Spring already!

At the start of the term we acknowledged the top academic achievers after the June exams, and congratulated those boys had had shown marked improvement. Many of the boys admitted they had under-performed, and we placed an emphasis on academic diligence this term. As we head into term 4 and edge closer to the November exams, it is vital that they learn from these mistakes and that all boys plan their time effectively and start to revise early enough. Looking at the 4<sup>th</sup> term calendar, examinations begin after just 4 weeks! Some serious thought needs to be given and action needs to take place with regards to the pending examinations.

The highlight of the term for me was the Hudson House Mother's and Son's Spring Day Tea. This was an exciting idea my wife and I had off the back of Women's Month in August and Woman's Day. More about that later...

Another focus in the House was that of mentorship and well-being. I would say for the majority, and for most of the time, Hudson House is a happy place with a friendly environment. There are, at times, a few that seem to spoil it for the majority and we are committed to making College and the BE a happy place for all boys. As per my recent communications, we encountered an issue in the school and BE with drugs. There are a few boys who were expelled from the BE and the school in the past few weeks. It is clear that the Governing Body has a zero-tolerance for dagga and similar substances and the warning has been given. Please speak to your sons about the decisions they make and what they are being exposed to. We continue to do sweeps of the BE for any contraband.

The party/social influence is probably one of the more prevalent concerns in raising teenagers today. Be aware of what your sons are doing, where they are going and who they are with during their 'social time'. Our goal, and I'm sure yours too, is to raise young men with integrity, empathy and those who are able to show responsibility. In doing this it is important that during these formative years we 'protective them from themselves.'

One of the themes in Hudson House this term has been *HONESTY*. Whilst this may sound like a simple and straightforward principle/value, it is something that teenage boys struggle with at times. The default for a boy who

has been caught out is to be on the defensive, and we are all certainly protective of ourselves and this would be normal. The thing that concerns me is when a boy takes to being dishonest and telling lies to defend his position or actions when he knows he is in the wrong. After all, the very reason he feels the need to tell a lie is cover what he has actually done. One of the values we try and teach the boys in Hudson House is to own up and take responsibility for their actions. To make a mistake or to get something wrong is okay, it happens. But to then make a decision to be untruthful is not okay. And so it happens that boys have to learn the hard way, that when they lie and get caught out, there is a further punishment for that dishonesty. So in essence we want to teach them that if they front up and tell the truth, it will be easier on them. Without trying to make you feel like you can't trust your sons, I urge you to scrutinise what they say and not always take it at face value — especially when it comes to them getting into trouble. Something my father taught me from a young age is, "There are always two sides to a story."



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## MCOBA Engagement Evenings



The MCOBA, together with One Life Church, have started an initiative which has been well received by most of the boys. We have had a few Engagement Evenings this term where there have been guest speakers who have shared their life story with the boys, and through this we have hoped to create dialogue and lessons for the boys to learn. The more recent one, on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> September, focused on drugs which is a very relevant topic. We were joined by a Police Officer who specialises in Narcotics and a recovering cocaine addict, who has been 'clean' for many years. The honesty and vulnerability of these two gentlemen was most encouraging and eye-opening, and hopefully the boys were able to learn from and take heed from their experiences.

## Hudson House Outreach

During the soccer season, we invited some boys and girls from the Kenosis Community Trust to play a soccer match against the College U15C soccer team. Kenosis provides foster care for up to 18 children with three foster mothers. These are vulnerable children often orphaned by HIV/AIDS. They are given a home and schooling and are supported by a governmental foster care grant. The reason for this was to give the children of Kenosis an opportunity to play a fun, yet competitive, soccer match and have the opportunity to bring them onto campus.

Further to this, I am wanting to create an Outreach Program for our House, starting in January 2020. I believe it is important for our boys to look outwardly, and not just worry about thems elves, even at a young age. I would like to create a few easy opportunities for the boys to interact with the kids from Kenosis, whose ages range from 8 to 20, and opportunities to contribute or serve the Kenosis Community.
