From the Housemaster

My wife and I had the wonderful privilege of celebrating our oldest son's second birthday early in August. While I do not like the label I have often heard of the dreaded "terrible two's". As a parent one cannot say for sure when this phase will present itself in your child or if such a thing actually exists. I would never say my child is terrible, in fact he can be boarder-line angelic at times. There have, however, been a number of behavioural displays of late that could fall into the terrible category. As parents of teenage boys you might look back to the stage my son is currently in with fondness, as your son now potentially finds himself in quite another stage of life. You may now have to endure your son's journey through puberty. This can indeed be a daunting task for a parent since, like me, you never know exactly when and how it will be presented in your child.

I am no expert on the topic, but we all know that teenage boys undergo many physiological changes as they move through puberty. I am sure that if you had to do a mere comparison of your son's physical stature at the start of the year to now, you will notice a big difference. Experts will tell you that the physiological development is not isolated, as it dovetails with another form of development, namely psychological. This makes things interesting to say the least. Not only do young teenage boys need to deal with the physical changes taking place in their bodies, but also the multitude of emotions they experience on a daily basis.

Knowing that they are developing at a rapid rate is one thing, but quite another to know how to deal with it.

This is where parents, guardians, mentors and teachers have a very important role to play. The thing is that no teenager comes with a manual. It is all good and well to know that they are developing at a rapid rate, but quite another to know how to deal with it. What makes matters even more interesting is that how boys behave in Nathan House and how they behave at home with mom and dad can be vastly—different. The College BE is a very different environment to

home — you are surrounded by peers 24/7, mom and dad is not around, there are prefects in your house and there is a different set of rules to abide by, just to name a few. As different as these environments are I do think that a similar approach can be used in either one for meaningful engagement.

Before anything can be done there needs to be an established relationship of trust. Teenage boys need to know they can trust you. If that relationship is in place it allows for better communication and understanding. I think the understanding bit can be the part we as adults most easily miss, especially if there has always been a good relationship in place. I say this as one cannot necessarily assume that the status quo remains and that your child behaves exactly the same as he always has, as there is a great deal of growth and development the boys

are going through. I believe two things need to take place at this stage; the first is doing one's best to understand the boy and the second is for the boy to feel that sufficient effort was made to understand him. It might seem a bit simplistic, but this will ensure that a good level of trust is maintained, even if he disagrees with what you do or how you go about what you do at home. Throughout these tumultuous years, or call it the "terrible teens" if you wish, these young men need us adults to be a constant in their lives. They need a solid point of reference to which they can always return if they are getting it wrong, whatever it might be. Being consistent, fair, loving, encouraging and everything else that is required from the adults in this relationship, does not always seem worth it at the time, but is so necessary for


healthy relationships and development in the long term.

He writes on a list of verbs he calls dadverbs, which can be found below. These are very simple relational actions, that have a profound effect on our children. His book is a very good read if any dads are interested.

Thank you for what you do as parents and for supporting us as we seek to bring out the best in your boys.


