Weekend Sporting Achievements

This week saw College start some of their summer sports programme. There were waterpolo, cricket and basketball matches on the go, as well as athletics at the Menlo Park Trials at the local stadium. Our 1st XI took part in the St David's Cricket Festival up in Gauteng.



Cricket

Maritzburg College 1st XI took part in the St David's Festival up in Gauteng over the weekend. Arlier in the week we played Hilton College in a T20 match. We also played 12 matches against Glenwood winning all 12 with some excellent batting and bowling performances across the teams.

1st XI vs Hilton - T20

The Maritzburg College 1st XI took on a strong Hilton side at the varsity oval on Tuesday night which saw the College boys come away with a well-deserved 27 run win. College won the toss and chose to bat first. Chad Fortmann was the pick of the batsmen at the top of the order with some clean hitting getting him to a score of 41. There were some other valuable contributions in the 20's getting the team to a very respectable 132/5 in the allotted 20 overs. The bowlers started brilliantly and gave nothing away. They bowled very tightly and were supported well by the fielders and kept the pressure on the Hilton batsmen. The pick of the bowlers was paceman Mondli Khumalo (2/16 in 4 overs) and Michael King (1/5 in 3 overs).

St David's Festival

Our 1st Cricket team travelled to Johannesburg to participate in the St David's Cricket Festival where they played two matches. The first game was against St Stithians. After losing the toss and being asked to bowl, the bowlers found it tough going on a pitch that was great for batting. Saints ended their 65 overs on 308/4. The College boys came out to bat and a partnership between captain Jacques van der Walt and opener Tristan Elam saw them end the day on 138/2 with Elam on 74 and van der Walt on 44. Day 2 saw the batsmen continue, scoring freely and with great control. After a partnership of 184 Elam fell for a well-played 87. van der Walt down kept scoring with ease and reached his century. He would end his innings on a superb 150, retiring hurt due to a back strain. Other contributors to the innings were Ross Klusener (53 not out) and Chad Fortmann (23 not out). College took a 44 run lead before declaring on 352/4. Saints came out to bat with their only intention to bat for the rest of the day, which they did, getting to 235/3 with Michael King being the pick of the bowlers (2/18). The match ended in a draw.

The 2nd game of the festival saw Maritzburg College take on a strong St Johns team. After winning the toss and inserting the opposition on a sticky wicket, the College bowlers didn't hit their lines and lengths and went unrewarded. The wicket got better and better as the day went on and a combination of average bowling and some brilliant batting, St Johns posted a mammoth 424/6 after their 70 overs. The pick of the College bowlers was seamer Dean Dyer (3/83). College then set out to put in a similar performance with the bat on a good wicket. Opener Andrew Todd was in great touch and got to the end of day 1 on 58 with the score on 117/3. Day 2 started poorly losing 2 wickets early. Todd (58), Ross Klusener (50) and Dyer (49) were the main contributors before being bowled out for 273, 151 runs behind St Johns' 1st innings total. St John's chose to enforce the follow on College threw away wickets at regular intervals and were reeling at 15/4. College went to tea on 100/7, still 51 behind and an hour left of play to survive. Todd (31) who had played with exceptional maturity was very unlucky to get out just after tea. Chad Fortmann and Mondli Khumalo then set out to bat for just under an hour and did a great job until Khumalo was out. This left youngster Andile Simelane with the big job of sticking it out for 15 minutes with senior partner Fortmann until the close



of play. Everyone was kept on the edge of their seats as Fortmann (27 not out) managed to see out the last over of the day to earn a draw out of the game.

Basketball

The College team kept within range during the second quarter, being 13 - 19 at the end of this period and also outscored the visitors 20 - 15 in the final quarter.
