Dear Parents and Guardians


Welcome back to Term 4. On Saturday we celebrate **World Teachers Day**. In many countries, Teachers' Days are special days to appreciate teachers, and honour them for their special contributions in a particular field, or the community in general. The date on which Teachers' day is celebrated varies from country to country and are distinct from **World Teachers' Day** which is officially celebrated across the world on October 5.

The idea of celebrating World Teachers' Day started in many countries during the 20th century, and represents a significant effort to raise awareness, understanding and appreciation for the vital contribution that teachers make to education and development across the globe.

In many countries, the quality of education is undermined by a deficit of teachers. Added to the challenge of numbers is one of quality; all too often, teachers work without resources or proper training. We face a global learning crisis, with 250 million children not acquiring basic skills of reading and writing. As countries move through 2019 and the new development agenda is shaped, it is essential that teachers remain a priority. Worldwide:

- 1.4 million new teaching posts are required to achieve universal primary education
- 2.6 million replacement teachers are needed
- Sub-Saharan Africa has the largest need for additional primary teachers at 0.9 million (representing 63% of the world total)


Globally 58 million children of primary school age are currently out of school, 53% of them are girls. We need to take time to acknowledge the role that teachers play in society and more so in our daily lives.

TANKS Computer Coding

TANKS, powered by Tangibl™, has the vision to reach thousands of learners across our continent, introducing them to computer coding.

TANKS is a unique coding application (app) introducing learners from local communities to coding concepts, enticing them into software development careers.

The app uses puzzle pieces and image recognition on a mobile device to execute the "code" built, making use of actual puzzle pieces. No computers are thus needed, although many schools who have computers find it a fun way to introduce coding.

Under the supervision of Nelson Mandela University Computer Science associate professor Jean Greyling, an honours student, Byron Batteson, designed TANKS.

Over the past 2 years Prof Greyling has been conducting field studies, piloting the app across all nine provinces, reaching around 6000 learners. "With nearly 16 000 out of our 25 000 schools who do not have computer laboratories, TANKS attempts to empower schools to respond to the 4th Industrial Revolution realities", says Prof Greyling.

In March, 2019, UNESCO recognised TANKS in Paris as one of 60 global projects reaching out to local communities. It was runner-up as Technology Innovation of the Year at Africa Tech Week, and in September it received the Innovation Excellence Award at Nelson Mandela University.
