DID YOU KNOW?

- A modern school in every sense, Maritzburg College retains a strong sense of its **history and heritage.** Founded in 1863, this year, College is 159 years old. Our proud Old Boys Association celebrates its 125th anniversary this year
- The school unashamedly embraces and promotes its Core Values of **Commitment, Courage, Honesty, Respect, Integrity and Self-discipline,** which all our boys are expected to live out each day. Our College Credo includes an individual pledge for each boy to remain true to all that is College, its values, brotherhood and traditions.
- As the **largest and oldest all boys' school in KwaZulu-Natal**, we have 1300 boys of whom 485 are boarders residing in 5 boarding houses, supported by 50 live-in staff. Our staff to pupil ratio is 1:15.
- Having the boys fulfil their academic potential is our highest priority and we are committed to
 providing each boy with a well-rounded relevant and excellent education experience.
- The Class of 2021 produced an outstanding set of Matric results:
 - 100% pass rate and 89% Bachelor's Degree pass
 - 456 subject distinctions
 - 15 boys received seven distinctions and 10 boys received six distinctions
 - Seven boys placed on the top 10 in the district
- Our innovative pastoral care programme, managed through the 10 school day houses, aims to build a community within the school, creating supportive systems and positive relations and promoting a strong ethos of mutual care and concern. Through mentorship, we help each of our boys develop his sense of value and virtue-based character.
- Maritzburg College is a modern, relevant multi-racial school that embraces all that is best in South Africa's ever-changing environment, and has a crucial role to play in nation building. Our Social Awareness Programme, involving pupil, staff and parents, is actively seeking ways to embrace and manage diversity in the school, and ensure this becomes embedded in the quality education we offer.
- Our sports facilities are world class, catering for all the major sports and a number of lesser ones too. Covering 25 hectares, the campus includes a High Performance Sports Centre, two indoor & two outdoor basketball courts, a world-class hockey AstroTurf, a full size heated water polo pool, seven tennis courts, four squash courts, seven sports fields, an indoor shooting range. In addition we have the Dusi River on our doorstep, and access to the AB Jackson Astro, cycling velodrome, Maritzburg cricket oval, Harry Gwala soccer stadium and Msunduzi Athletics Track
- Currently there are **318 College Old Boys** who have played sport at an international level, more than any other school in the country.
- We have for many years excelled on the rugby field, and currently have more rugby teams than any other school in the country. Mr JM "Skonk" Nicholson was one of College's greatest catalysts for future rugby success; when he retired after 35 seasons as the coach of the First XV, 22 of his teams were unbeaten or lost only one match.
- College's Red Army 1st XI have also dominated the school hockey rankings over the years. 2022 saw 6 College OCs represent their country at the African Cup of Nations. As defending champions, South Africa faced Egypt in the final which saw OC 2017 Brad Sherwood, playing in his first international tournament, secure the win for his country, and World Cup qualification.
- Our 2022 Inter-House Athletics Championship, saw some long-standing records tumble with exceptional performances from the boys; Neo Mosebi, broke Peter Kyle's longstanding record (1974) of 10.60 secs in the U19 100m, with a time of 10.22 secs and is currently ranked 2nd in his age category in the world.

HISTORY OF RUGBY

Early Years

Founded in 1863, Maritzburg College played its first rugby match in 1870, against Hermannsburg. Playing on the old Market Square in the centre of town under Winchester Rules, College won by two goals to nil, in the first recorded rugby match played in the old Colony of Natal (let alone the whole of Africa – but that's another story altogether).

Rugby quickly became the game of choice at College and, apart from a short period of time in the 1880s and 1890s, when football enjoyed a considerable following, has remained the most popular winter sport at College.

Three Old Collegians appeared in the 1924 Springbok team to take on the touring British Lions: Bertram Vanderplank (front row, second right), Walter Clarkson (middle row, far left) and Bill Payn (middle of the middle row). The much-loved, versatile Payn taught at Durban High School from 1915 to 1953. He represented what is today KZN at five sports, and famously ran the 1922 Comrades Marathon in his rugby boots.



A stand-out player in the early years was strapping farm boy, Philip Nel, who was the First XV captain and all-powerful head prefect of the school in 1921. Nel captained the Springbok team on its all-conquering tour of Australia and New Zealand in 1937. It remains the only Springbok team in history to have defeated the All Blacks in New Zealand. Such was the quality of the play of his imperious team that it was given the tongue-in-cheek accolade of being "the greatest team to leave New Zealand's shores". On the ship returning home, Nel formally announced his retirement from Springbok rugby by throwing his trusty old rugger boots into the sea. Like Alexander the Great, he had no more worlds to conquer.

Enter the Skonkwaan

Although rugby enjoyed great prestige in the first few decades of the 20th Century, the appointment as First XV coach in 1948 of Mr JM "Skonk" Nicholson was the great catalyst for future success. Skonk's effect was immediate: his 1948 side lost only to old rivals, Durban High School, and in the following year Skonk (himself a former head prefect of "School") produced his first unbeaten team. He retired in 1982, after 35 seasons as the coach of the First XV. During that time, 22 of his teams were unbeaten or lost only one match.

Skonk had been head prefect of DHS in 1935. He remained a proud "Horse-fly" until his dying day.

Last 50 years

Outstanding teams in the last five decades include the 1972 First XV, which supplied 10 Craven Week players and conceded only one try in 19 matches; the 1978 First XV, which won all of its matches; the record-breaking 1985 team, which won all of its 18 matches, including a 44-0 triumph over Bishops and a 10-4 win over a Grey College side brimming with five SA Schools caps; the 1987 side that included SA Schools' captain Brenton Catterall and three other SA Schools' players; and the 1988 First XV, which won all 15 of its fixtures.

Despite the retirement of the much-loved Mr Nicholson in 1982, that decade was a period of almost unbroken triumph for Maritzburg College rugby, and from 1981-1990 losses were suffered only against Glenwood (twice), Hilton and DHS (once each) among KZN schools.

This rugby success continued into the 1990s, with the 1994 team delivering an unbeaten season against all South African teams, losing only to Gisborne BHS in the final of the World Schools' Tournament in Bowral, Australia. Another highlight of the decade was the unbeaten 1995 side, which enjoyed wins over Ermelo, Selborne, Grey High and Paul Roos Gymnasium, and big wins over Glenwood (61-13), Westville (62-6) and Kearsney (43-3). Skippered by Zane Aszalos, the 1995 XV contained two SA Schools' captains – Pieter Dixon (1995) and Richard Kelly (1996).

By 2022, the explosion of professional rugby around the world meant that the number of Old Collegians playing the sport on the international stage had increased dramatically, and Maritzburg College alumni have in the last 30 years won caps for the Springboks (including Joel Stransky, Butch James, Peter Grant and Jesse Kriel), England, USA, Italy, Germany, Cyprus and Spain.

We welcome Jesse Kriel (OC 2012) back to his alma mater as our guest speaker at our Reunion assembly.

For decades, the school's redoubtable Chief Induna, Zablon Kwelha, was a loyal supporter of the First XV. He travelled widely by bus with the Maritzburg College boys to watch them play, often taking bets on their success with his contemporaries at DHS and Glenwood. An unofficial adviser to his great friend, Mr Nicholson, he fervently held the view that each College First XV should contain at least one red-headed player – "For extra fire!"

Maritzburg College First XVs have continued to play with pride and old-fashioned guts, and all 28 of the school's rugby teams play with fire, passion and some skill. Long may that continue.

Rugby in 2022

Today the school fields up to 28 teams and participates in the foremost rugby festivals in the country. In 2022, in addition to playing its fixtures against traditional rivals like today's Hilton College, the First XV has taken part in the Fichardt Park High School Festival in Bloemfontein the St Stithians Easter Festival in Johannesburg, and, only last weekend, in the Wildeklawer Festival in Kimberley. Six overseas tours have been undertaken, most recently to the United Kingdom in 2019.

The Class of 1972 celebrated its 50th Reunion on Thursday night. The First XV of that year, skippered by Roy Davidson, was a talented one and supplied 10 members to the Craven Week side (to record the tally set in 1963). It gave away only one try in a long, unbeaten season of 19 games – an intercept try by Hilton College!



RUGBY COLLEGE VS HILTON COLLEGE

Maritzburg College was founded in 1863 and Hilton College in 1872 - our old friends from "up the road" are sincerely congratulated on attaining their sesquicentennial this year.

The two schools met on the rugby field for the first time in 1875 and have enjoyed an unbroken, friendly rivalry ever since. The results of matches from the 19th century are not known, but both schools fielded formidable teams in those early years. Both won the Murray Cup, the premier rugby trophy of old Natal – Hilton in 1898 and Maritzburg College in 1900. They are the only two schools to have done so.

Travelling to Hilton in those early days, before motorised transport, was a major expedition, and there are colourful accounts in the early issues of the College school magazine of the vicissitudes of those ox-wagon journeys. Hilton has always provided tough opposition to College, particularly in the years before World War II, when they won far more often than they lost. They have won four times since 1986, including wins in 2018 (18-29) and 2019 (17-21), and many other encounters have been very close indeed.

No fixture was played in 2020 due to the COVID pandemic, but in a fiercely-contested fixture at Hilton last year, in almost arctic conditions, the visiting College XV under C Thunder eked out a 14-10 win. The Hilton side this year is a fine one, and has enjoyed a string of stirring victories thus far this season.

We look forward eagerly today to the 172nd encounter between two schools with proud rugby traditions - good luck to both teams!



HOCKEY HISTORY VS HILTON

Hockey has had official sport status at Maritzburg College since 1974. Since then, the game has grown in stature with College having had the honour of having been the first school in South Africa to lay an artificial surface on its premises and at the end of 2018 the AstroTurf was resurfaced.

Since 1951, College has had 35 Old Boys represent South Africa and 1 for Canada, more international players than any school in the world, including 3 captains. M Guise-Brown, T Dlungwana, T Kok, T Paton, S Nolutshungu and N Lembethe recently competed in the 2021 Tokyo Olympic Games.

In 2022, B Sherwood became the 35th Old Boy represent South Africa, making his debut at the Africa Cup of Nations. Sherwood scored the winning shootout in the final against Egypt, to secure World Cup qualification.

The school has now produced 103 SA Schools Caps in its history with 94 of these having been earned since 1980. In 2019 (the last time a SA Schools side was selected) there were three 1st XI players who were selected for the SA Schools U18 team, namely, S Ngcongo, M Maphumulo and G Pio.

Today will be the 84th time College take on Hilton. College have been victorious on 52 occasions. Hilton have won 16 and 15 times the fixture has ended in a draw. Last year's 1st XI fixture was an exciting match between two strong teams, which saw College come out on top winning 2-1.

We welcome Hilton to Pape's on a very special day for College and look forward to some competitive matches played in good spirit.


