DID YOU KNOW...

- A modern school in every sense, Maritzburg College retains a strong sense of its history and heritage. Founded in 1863, this year, College is 161 years old. From humble beginnings to a POWERHOUSE school...
- The school unashamedly embraces and promotes its Core Values of Commitment, Courage, Honesty, Respect, Integrity and Self-discipline, which all our boys are expected to live out each day. Our College Credo includes an individual pledge for each boy to remain true to all that is College, its values, brotherhood and traditions.
- As the largest and oldest all boys' school in KwaZulu-Natal, we have 1270 boys of whom 500 are boarders residing in 5 boarding houses, supported by 50 live-in staff. Our staff to pupil ratio is 1:14.
- Having the boys fulfil their academic potential is our highest priority and we are committed to
 providing each boy with a well-rounded relevant and excellent education experience.
- Our innovative pastoral care programme, managed through the 10 school day houses, aims to build a community within the school, creating supportive systems and positive relations, and promoting a strong ethos of mutual care and concern. Through mentorship, we help each of our boys develop his sense of value and virtue-based character.
- Maritzburg College is a modern, relevant multi-racial school that embraces all that is best in South
 Africa's ever-changing environment, and has a crucial role to play in nation building. Our Social
 Awareness Programme, involving pupil, staff and parents, is actively seeking ways to embrace and
 manage diversity in the school, and ensure this becomes embedded in the quality education we offer.
- Our sports facilities are world class, catering for all the major sports and a number of lesser ones
 too. Covering 25 hectares, the campus includes a High Performance Sports Centre, two indoor and
 two outdoor basketball courts, a world-class hockey AstroTurf, a full size heated water polo pool,
 seven tennis courts, four squash courts, seven sports fields, an indoor shooting range. In addition we
 have the Dusi River on our doorstep, and access to the AB Jackson astro, cycling velodrome,
 Maritzburg cricket oval, Harry Gwala soccer stadium and Msunduzi Athletics Track.
- Currently there are 330 College Old Boys who have played sport at an international level, more than any other school in the country.
- We have for many years excelled on the rugby field, and currently have 30 rugby teams. Mr JM "Skonk" Nicholson was one of College's greatest catalysts for future rugby success; when he retired after 35 seasons as the coach of the First XV, 22 of his teams were unbeaten or lost only one match.
- College's Red Army 1st XI have also dominated the school hockey rankings over the years. 2022 saw six College OCs represent their country at the African Cup of Nations. As defending champions, South Africa faced Egypt in the final which saw OC 2017 Brad Sherwood, playing in his first international tournament, secure the win for his country, and World Cup qualification.



HISTORY OF RUBGY

Early Years

Founded in 1863, Maritzburg College played its first rugby match in 1870, against Hermannsburg. Playing on the old Market Square in the centre of town under Winchester Rules, College won by two goals to nil, in the first recorded rugby match played in the old Colony of Natal (let alone the whole of Africa – but that's another story altogether).

Rugby quickly became the game of choice at College and, apart from a short period of time in the 1880's and 1890's, when football enjoyed a considerable following, has remained the most popular winter sport at College.

Three Old Collegians appeared in the 1924 Spring-bok team to take on the touring British Lions: Bertram Vanderplank (front row, second right), Walter Clarkson (middle row, far left) and Bill Payn (middle of the middle row). The much-loved, versatile Payn represented what is today KZN at five sports, and famously ran the 1922 Comrades Marathon in his rugby boots.



A stand-out player in the early years was strapping farm boy, Philip Nel, who was the First XV captain and all-powerful head prefect of the school in 1921. Nel captained the Springbok team on its all-conquering tour of Australia and New Zealand in 1937. It remains the only Springbok team in history to have defeated the All Blacks in New Zealand. Such was the quality of the play of his imperious team that it was given the tongue-in-cheek accolade of being "the greatest team to leave New Zealand's shores". On the ship returning home, Nel formally announced his retirement from Springbok rugby by throwing his trusty old rugger boots into the sea. Like Alexander the Great, he had no more worlds to conquer. The Philip Nel Pavilion on Goldstone's was opened in October 2022, and was named in honour of this famed Springbok captain and leader of men.

Enter the Skonkwaan

Although rugby enjoyed great prestige in the first few decades of the 20th Century, the appointment as First XV coach in 1948 of Mr JM "Skonk" Nicholson was the great catalyst for future success. Skonk's effect was immediate: his 1948 side lost only to old rivals, Durban High School, and in the following year Skonk (himself a former head prefect of "School") produced his first unbeaten team. He retired in 1982, after 35 seasons as the coach of the First XV. During that time, 22 of his teams were unbeaten or lost only one match.

Last 50 years

Outstanding teams in the last five decades include the 1972 First XV, which supplied 10 Craven Week players and conceded only one try in 19 matches; the 1978 First XV, which won all of its matches; the record-breaking 1985 team, which won all of its 18 matches, including a 44-0 triumph over Bishops and a 10-4 win over a Grey College side brimming with five SA Schools caps; the 1987 side that included SA Schools' captain Brenton Catterall and three other SA Schools' players; and the 1988 First XV, which won all 15 of its fixtures.

Despite the retirement of the much-loved Mr Nicholson in 1982, that decade was a period of almost unbroken triumph for Maritzburg College rugby, and from 1981-1990 losses were suffered only against Glenwood (twice), Hilton and DHS (once each) among KZN schools.

This rugby success continued into the 1990s, with the 1994 team delivering an unbeaten season against all South African teams, losing only to Gisborne BHS in the final of the World Schools' Tournament in Bowral, Australia. Another highlight of the decade was the unbeaten 1995 side, which enjoyed wins over Ermelo, Selborne, Grey High and Paul Roos Gymnasium, and big wins over Glenwood (61-13), Westville (62-6) and Kearsney (43-3). Skippered by Zane Aszalos, the 1995 XV contained two SA Schools' captains – Pieter Dixon (1995) and Richard Kelly (1996).

By 2024, the explosion of professional rugby around the world meant that the number of Old Collegians playing the sport on the international stage had increased dramatically, and Maritzburg College alumni have in the last 30 years won caps for the Springboks (including Joel Stransky, Butch James, Peter Grant, Jesse Kriel and Ntuthuko Mchunu), England, USA, Italy, Germany, Cyprus and Spain.

That tally has since increased to 330.



Maritzburg College First XVs have continued to play with pride and old-fashioned guts, and all 30 of the school's rugby teams play with fire, passion and some skill. Long may that continue.

Rugby in 2024

These days, the school still fields up to 30 rugby teams and participates in the foremost rugby festivals in the country.

In 2024, in addition to playing its fixtures against traditional rivals from near and far, the First XV will take part in the St John's College Easter Festival in Johannesburg and the Wildeklawer Festival in Kimberley. Six overseas tours have been undertaken, most recently to the United Kingdom in 2019.

In 2023, six College boys were selected for the KZN (Sharks) Schools team that played at Craven Week, with today's skipper P "Rambo" Kubheka and today's fullback LS Kunene earning selection for the 2023 SA Schools' starting team.



HOCKEY AT MARITZBURG COLLEGE

Hockey has only had official sport status at Maritzburg College since 1974. Since then, the game has grown in stature, with College hockey being relocated from the luscious greens of Barns' to having had the honour of being the first school in South Africa to lay an artificial surface on its premises. The new home for the 'Red Army' was to be named after the fifth Maritzburg College Headmaster, Mr Septimus Pape (1926-1937). The facility saw timely resurfacing at the end of 2018. The most recent inclusion to the Pape's complex brings forth the opportunity for College hockey to be enjoyed under lights, with the first official home fixture for the 2024 season being played against Clifton on a Friday night. The completion of this project endeavours to add great value to the hockey fraternity for generations to come.

Since 1951, College has had 36 Old Boys picked to play for South Africa and one for Canada, more international players than any school in the world, including three captains. M Guise-Brown, T Dlungwana, T Kok, T Paton, and S Nolutshungu and N Lembethe recently competed at in the 2021 Tokyo Olympic Games. B. Sherwood, made his debut in 2022 at the most recent Africa Cup of Nations, scoring the winning shootout in the final against Egypt, to secure World Cup qualification.

In 2024, A Walstroom, became the 36th Old Boy to be picked for South Africa. He will be making his debut at the 13th African Games in Accra, Ghana. This national call up follows both his and J.Campbell (OC 2018) inclusion in the SA squad at the 2024 Hockey 5's World cup recently held in Oman, Egypt. The school has now produced 103 SA Schools Caps in its history with 91 of these having been earned since 1980. Last year, One first XI player, N. Holmes was selected for the SA Schools U17 High Performance training squad who participated at the Dito Mirnawan Cup in Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia. Four boys namely D.Jackson, C.Jenkins, S.Sithembu and B.Thorton-Dibb were selected for the SA U16 High Performance Camp. 2023 saw 35 players being included in KZN inland teams at the U14, U16 and U18 level. this comprises 40% of provincial selections for Maritzburg College Hockey. These annual representations positively contribute to and strengthen the consistency of Maritzburg College hockey culture.

Tackle safety law changes for school and club rugby

- Tackles in open play must be made at the base of the sternum (breastbone) or below.
- Double tackles (as per Law) are permitted in open play but must be made at the base of the sternum or
- The tackle height law does not apply to the tackle assist on condition no head & neck contact is made.
- The ball carrier in open play may carry the ball into contact in a forward bent body position, but must have head and shoulders above the hips, and must make the 'safe zone' between the sternum and midthigh, accessible to the tackler.
- The ball carrier in open play may not carry the ball headfirst into contact with the body fully bent and horizontal, or with head lower than the hips.
- The ball carrier may 'pick-and-drive' or "pick and go" with their head & shoulders lower than their hips (lower risk of danger).
- The ball carrier at the 'pick-and-drive' may not place a hand on the ground before contact to propel themselves forward into contact (the technique known locally as the 'cannon-arm').
- A player may only bind (latch) onto the 'pick-and-drive' ball carrier once they have already made contact with the defender.
- A ball carrier may have their head & shoulders below their hips when they are in a realistic position/opportunity to score a try.

50/22 Law applicable to all school and club rugby

- If an attacking team kicks the ball from anywhere in their own half and it bounces inside the opposition's 22 before then bouncing into touch, the kicking team gets the throw at the resultant
- If the ball is "taken back" into the attacking team's half, they cannot be awarded the resultant lineout in the 50/22 law unless a phase of play takes place (maul/tackle or ruck) and after which the kick is made.
