
A special mention must be made to Mr S Maharaj, Ms N Gumede, and Mr D Joshua who all attended these camps to supervise and observe our future leaders.

Luke Walker was selected by the Husqvarna Racing Team, to participate as one of their factory National Racing Team riders. Luke competed in three disciplines of motorcycle racing - namely Cross-Country, Enduro and Extreme Enduro.


In the Cross-Country Regional (KZN) Championship, Luke won all six rounds and is the KZN Cross Country Champ.

In the Cross-Country National Championships, he completed the last and final round in Bloemfontein, becoming the National Champion in his class, OR3 and finishing 3rd overall.

In Extreme Enduros, he has completed four rounds of the Gold Class and is currently 6th overall nationally.

In the Enduro Championship KZN Regional, he has won the Championship for 2024.

For the National Championship, he is currently 2nd overall and the final round will be held in Pilgrims Rest at the end of September.

Callum has been selected to represent at the South African Masters, Junior, and Senior Inter-Regional and Open Champs - to be held from 22nd to 29th September in Johannesburg, Gauteng.
