Dear Elliott House parents and guardians,

I am happy to have the opportunity to place the Elliott House adventure of Term 2, in a summarised letter.

The first half of the year has been a wonderful time for the boys in Elliott House. The challenges of living in a new boarding house was short lived by a great group of boys. Adjustment to a new living environment is a daunting thought, especially when the boarding house you moving to was previously known as Alcatraz. This might be an encouraging thought for a distant parents and guardians, however, as the Housemaster leading the Elliott House team and boys, I have worked hard on removing this impression. I believe that when boys are given the benefit of the doubt, they will live up to the positive impressions and expectations we bestow upon them. Elliott House was transformed from a house to a home for every boarder living in it.

Each boarder in Elliott House is privileged to have his own room. This has enhanced their sense of independence and gave them a part of the house to be responsible for. Clean living conditions along with personal hygiene is promoted. The mental health of each boarder in Elliott House is important. The team whom themselves are the core group leaders of their own set of about ten boys each, regularly check up on them. The assistance from the remote support (parents/guardians) is vital. In the event a boy may feel that he needs to only connect with his parent or guardian about a matter, it is important to know that if the need arises, the necessary intervention of a master on site may be called upon. I would like to encourage the parents/ guardians to inform me about anything that might influence the behaviour of their young man while in our care.

The mission for the Elliott House team is to instil a sense of pride in their house. Our efforts were supported by the enhancement of the Piet Snyman common room. The second term started with a two-week period in which the common room was given a complete face lift. I commend the boys for showing patience during this time. Mrs Emerson applied her decor expertise to provide the room a modern and functional feel. A place where the boarders may feel valued while they socialise with their brothers. A new table tennis table, and pool table added to the excitement of having a more modern looking room. The tuck shop has its own storage and counter from which it operates as well. I thank Mr Emerson for making available the funds needed and Mrs Emerson for spending those funds wisely during the time and efforts applied. This has certainly assisted in the Elliott House team's efforts to allow the boys to feel valued and to live in an environment they may feel proud of.

In a talk held with the boys, one of my main focus words shared was "opportunity". The varied opportunities available ensures the holistic development of each individual. Apart from the obvious academic, sporting and cultural opportunities available, we also encourage our young men to think of themselves as being developed. Our boys must also take on the responsibility toward themselves to

continuously develop by seeking to better themselves as human beings. A growth mind set is essential and accepting life to be a never-ending learning experience.

I make mention of the freedom and extra time made available to our matric boys in their specially designed daily routines. Their freedom fits within a set structure and is reliant on the disciplined approach of each boy to succeed. Their routines allow for academic/learning time, sport and cultural expression and provides time for social interactions with their brothers. Living the College experience as a College boy is about taking part in events, bonding with brothers on the sporting fields and even sharing the stage in a production. The Classroom allows cognitive development in which the growth of our young men are evident. In every sphere our College core values are practiced. Being involved, abiding by the rules and guidelines helps shape the young minds of the College boy. They become responsible and socially just young men. The boys become a product ready to join countless other College Old Boys, in "the big world".

I am proud of the boarders of Elliott House who have allowed themselves to be guided and who lived to the fullest by taking on opportunities presented. Memories have been made with their brothers. For the boarders who might feel that they have not harnessed their opportunities fully yet, there is still time!

Elliott House boarders bonded under their new banner and soon faced the challenges posed by the academic pressure of Term 2. I watched how each of the 7 weeks before exams passed by like a racing heartbeat. It was evident that each boarder anxiously anticipated and then ensued necessary preparations towards their very last Mid-Year examination. Paging through books broke the silence of each prep session. Our teaching staff/Core group leaders on the team assisted by giving extra lessons in the Piet Snyman common room. All hands were on deck and every effort was made to see our boarders through. The Elliott House boarder has had, and still has every opportunity to pursue and succeed in all spheres. The fundamental scaffolding in which they thrive is provided. A well-structured study routine during June examinations gave the boys the necessary guidelines to practice their responsibility towards self-study and carving a path towards achieving their academic goals. This effort will be repeated during Trial and Final examinations. The June exam period was a taste for parents/guardians, staff and boarders of that which is to come. An experience to improve upon if need be. Conversations had with me and the core group leaders, set expectations for realistic planning and building of a solid foundation. We thank those teachers who gave up their time to provide extra lessons during the evenings and provide continuity of interest in the academic program.



I am going to close off by adding the following, not of my own words:




Lisu (above), absent from the occasion, received his certificate & pizza as well.

A ship is always safest while docked in the harbour, however, that is not what it was made for and so performs to its full potential while at sea, exposed to the elements.





Our boarders had the opportunity to cast their vote in the 2024 National Elections.






SOME IMPORTANT DATES IN TERM 3:
