RUGBY VS PRETORIA BOYS HIGH

Today, we welcome PBHS from our nation's capital city to Goldstone's, for the **58th** match in a rivalry that dates back to 1950. In that year, the College First XV went on a short, two-match tour to the Transvaal, as it was then known. The Red-Black-White emerged 6-0 winners in a gruelling first encounter in Pretoria, in a match characterised by the "sound defence on the part of the Pretoria team". Thereafter, the two schools met infrequently until the 1980s, during which they played six matches. This more regular contact continued into the 1990s, and since 1999 the two schools have played against each other every year.

More recently this has become a "home and away" arrangement and Maritzburg College very much prizes these matches against "Boys High". We are schools with similar values, similar attitudes and similar strengths on the sports-field. Each year, our rugby teams play up to 29 matches, as they do today, and most of them are hard-fought, close encounters. No other English-speaking school in our programme is as close to us in overall rugby strength.

Last year, the Red-Black-White hoops of Maritzburg College triumphed in both fixtures over their friendly rivals, the "Candies", in fairly high-scoring affairs, and PBHS will today be very keen to turn around a string of consecutive defeats going back to 2017. Today is likely to provide another immensely pleasing day's rugby, as we again welcome our special friends from Pretoria, for this long-awaited fixture.

Rugby Trivia vs PBHS

- The bi-annual derby between Maritzburg College and Pretoria Boys High School sees up to 29 rugby matches played between the two schools.
- Apart from the rugby, the two schools will this weekend compete at hockey (16 teams), chess, debating, golf, public-speaking, squash and table-tennis.
- With up to 800 boys competing from each school, the bi-annual derby is one of the largest in the world!
- The first rugby match played between the two schools was in 1950, when Max Prozesky's touring College side won 6-0.
- Future Springbok flyhalf, Keith Oxlee, captained the College team two years later in another match in Pretoria, winning 9-3.
- A 29-year hiatus ensued, before future Natal flyhalf Henry Coxwell skippered his unbeaten 1981 College First XV to a 15-3 victory over the "Candies".
- College enjoyed a golden era of rugby success in the 1980s and this is reflected in College wins over PBHS by the 1983, 1985, 1986, 1988, 1990 and 1992 First XVs.
- The 1996 College First XV was skippered by SA Schools' captain, Richard Kelly. His PBHS opponent that year was none other than future RWC-winning Bok captain and legend, John Smit. Today, John is a Boys High parent.
- In 1996, College won the first encounter 18-17 at the Grey High Festival, but Boys High turned the tables in the return match at the Kearsney Festival to win 11-19, after "a hard-driving performance by their excellent pack", and in doing so triumphed over College for the first time in 12 attempts.
- PBHS won their first "double" over College in 2008, repeating that success in 2013.
- College has won the double on 11 occasions, including 10 out of the last 11 completed (i.e. non-COVID) seasons.
- College's biggest winning margin was reached in 2002 and 2016, when, respectively, "Bash" Grant's high-riding XV won 57-8 and Kelton Thunder's team won 55-6.
- PBHS' biggest margin is 26 points after a 15-41 win in 2009.

HOCKEY AT MARITZBURG COLLEGE

Hockey has only had official sport status at Maritzburg College since 1974. Since then, the game has grown in stature, with College hockey being relocated from the luscious greens of Barns' to having had the honour of being the first school in South Africa to lay an artificial surface on its premises.

The new home for the 'Red Army' was to be named after the fifth Maritzburg College Headmaster, Mr Septimus Pape (1926-1937). The facility saw timely resurfacing at the end of 2018. The most recent inclusion to the Pape's complex brings about the opportunity for College hockey to be enjoyed under lights, with the first official home fixture for the 2024 season being played against Clifton on a Friday night. The completion of this project endeavours to add great value to the hockey fraternity for generations to come.

Since 1951, College has had 36 Old Boys selected to play for South Africa and one for Canada, more international players than any school in the world, including three captains. M Guise-Brown, T Dlungwana, T Kok, T Paton, S Nolutshungu and N Lembethe competed at the 2021 Tokyo Olympic Games.

In 2022, B Sherwood became the 35th Old Boy to be selected for South Africa, making his debut at the Africa Cup of Nations, scoring the winning shootout in the final against Egypt, to secure World Cup qualification. Brad also played in the Paris Olympics in 2024.

The school has now produced 103 SA Schools caps in its history with 91 of these having been earned since 1980. This year, one of our 1st XI players earned selection to the SA Schools U18B squad. Three boys were selected for the SA U17A squad. Two of our u17A boys have been selected to represent South Africa at the Dato Mirnawan Cup in Malaysia in November this year. Old Collegian A Walstroom made his debut at the Nations Cup in Malaysia earlier this year.

HOCKEY VS PRETORIA BOYS HGH SCHOOL

Pretoria Boys High is one of College's oldest rivals and our oldest inter-province exchange fixture. The first match played between the two teams was in 1974.

A summary of results is as follows: 76 matches have been played, College have won 42, Pretoria Boys High have won 13, and 21 have ended in a draw. College won the game at PBHS earlier this year, setting up what could be a very exciting game of hockey

We are looking forward to welcoming our friends from Pretoria Boys High School to College and onto Pape's.

MARITZBURG COLLEGE'S RUGBY AND SPORT

Founded in 1863, Maritzburg College (known locally as "College") is the oldest boys' high school in KZN. It played its first rugby match in 1870, winning by two goals to nil against Hermannsburg on the Market Square in town, in the first recorded rugby match played in the old Colony of Natal. The College team was captained by George Macfarlane.

In 1870, George Macfarlane captained the College team to victory over Hermannsburg. By 1900, he was Col. GJ Macfarlane CMG, a past commanding officer of the Natal Carbineers and the mayor of Pietermaritzburg. In the photo on the left, Col. Macfarlane accompanies Field Marshal Lord Roberts, while the latter pays a visit to the colonial capital during the Boer War.



From 1944 until 1982, the school enjoyed the coaching services of the much-loved Mr JM "Skonk" Nicholson. In Skonk's 35 seasons in charge of the First XV, 22 of his teams were unbeaten or lost only one match.

His stress unusually evident, Skonk Nicholson walks towards the field immediately before the return home match versus a strong Glenwood side in 1979, alongside his skipper, Craig Jamieson. The College XV turned around a record 6-33 loss in Durban into a 7-3 win on its beloved Goldstone's.





Amongst College's 329 international sportsman/officials, Philip Nel captained the "Greatest Springboks" to New Zealand in 1937, Kevin Pietersen (England) and David "Killer" Miller are bludgeoning batsmen of renown, and former Springbok lock, Cecil "Bill" Payn, earned fame as "the Man who ran the Comrades Marathon in his rugby boots"!

Popular rugby referee, Bryn Emms, recently earned selection for the 2024 SA touch rugby team. When he earns his first cap, Bryn will become international #330.

Jesse Kriel won his second RWC gold medal with the 2023 Springboks, and has thus far earned 68 Test caps and scored 15 tries for the Boks.

In 2024, up to 30 rugby teams will don the school's proud Red-Black-White hoops.

In addition, several Old Collegians have represented other countries, notably:

Frank Goedeke (Germany 1999), Wayne Munn (SA 1999), Geoff Appleford (England 2001), Justin Hundley (USA 2007), Grant Rees (SA 2007), Matthew Hawkins (USA captain 2008), Andrew Binikos (Cyprus 2010), Marcel Coetzee (Germany 2016).

Current Sharks players from Maritzburg College include prop Ntuthuko Mchunu, hooker Fez Mbatha and lock Jeandre Labuschangne.

Some Trivia about these players:

• The remarkably talented and versatile **Bill Payn** played sport for Natal in five disciplines, and also earned a Military Medal for gallantry in the Western Desert in World War II.

Bill Payn (back right) poses as the coach of the Durban High School First XV in 1935. The captain of the DHS team is the head prefect of "School" – Bill's cousin, none other than James Mervyn "Skonk" Nicholson.

- While a prisoner-of-war in Poland during the war, Bill coached burly prop, Okey Geffin, at goal-kicking. Geffin booted the Boks to a 4-0 series win over the touring 1949 All Blacks.
- When he died in 1990, aged 96, "Beevee" Vanderplank was the oldest Springbok.
- After leading the Boks to victory over the 1937 All Blacks, **Phil Nel** tossed his boots into the sea on the way home "he had no more worlds to conquer".

• In World War II, SA soldiers would often chaff their Kiwi compadres with the question, "What was the greatest team to leave New Zealand's shores"? The cheeky answer was, "The 1937 Springboks, of course!"

 In the old amateur days, Andy van der Watt was invariably referred to as the "Fastest Springbok Ever". His school record for the 100 yards was 9.9s.

• Andy played for the Natal Schools' teams for four seasons, 1962-1965 – a record eventually equalled by Clint Bruyns.

- Joel Stransky kicked all the points in the Boks' 15-12 win over the All Blacks in the 1995 RWC Final.
- A late-bloomer, Jem Thomson started off in College's U14F rugby team.
- **Pieter Dixon** is named after his grandfather, PGV van der Bijl, a former SA cricketer who became a revered headmaster of Bishops Prep. His uncle is the popular ex-fast-bowler, "Big Vince" who taught at College in the 1970s.
- **Butch James'** dad played football for SA, and his brother golf. An able wicketkeeper /batsman, Butch was in the same College First XI as "KP" Pietersen.

• A multitalented Rhodes Scholar, **Hubert "Trilby" Freakes** was killed in a 'plane crash in World War II while serving in the Royal Air Force. He captained Oxford University in the 1938 Varsity Match versus Cambridge.

- At the 1999 RWC, only one try was scored against the cup-winning Wallabies team - by Juan Grobler (USA)!
- Members of **Chad Erskine's** family have attended Maritzburg College since the 1870s, and Private Robert Erskine was College's first of 264 alumni killed in battle in the Drakensberg in 1873. Stephen (OC 1965), Andrew (OC 1967) and Stuart ("Sugar") (OC 1992) all captained SA at polo. The latest Erskine is currently in 4th Form.
- In his youth, Wim Visser was regarded as a basketball prodigy. He was SA Schools' captain in 1987.
- Brenton Catterall's father, Peter (1961), and Andrew Norton's father, Moray (1975), both captained the Natal Schools' Craven Week teams as Brenton himself did too.
- At 6'5" and 130 kg, **Warren Ansell** claims the proud title of being the biggest capped scrumhalf in test history!

Rugby is founded on principles of respect, sportsmanship, and camaraderie. It's crucial to remember that referees are volunteers who dedicate their time to ensure fair play on the field. They work hard to understand and apply the laws of the game to the best of their abilities.

Tackle safety law changes for school and club rugby

- Tackles in open play must be made at the base of the sternum (breastbone) or below.
- Double tackles (as per Law) are permitted in open play but must be made at the base of the sternum or below
- The tackle height law does not apply to the tackle assist on condition no head & neckeontact is made.
- The ball carrier in open play may carry the ball into contact in a forward bent body position, but must have head and shoulders above the hips, and must make the 'safe zone' between the sternum and midthigh, accessible to the tackler.
- The ball carrier in open play may not carry the ball headfirst into contact with the body fully bent and horizontal, or with head lower than the hips.
- The ball carrier may 'pick-and-drive' or "pick and go" with their head & shoulders lower than their hips (lower risk of danger).
- The ball carrier at the 'pick-and-drive' may not place a hand on the ground before contact to propel themselves forward into contact (the technique known locally as the 'cannon-arm').
- A player may only bind (latch) onto the 'pick-and-drive' ball carrier once they have already made contact with the defender.
- A ball carrier may have their head & shoulders below their hips when they are in a realistic position/opportunity to score a try.

50/22 Law applicable to all school and club rugby

- If an attacking team kicks the ball from anywhere in their own half and it bounces inside the
 opposition's 22 before then bouncing into touch, the kicking team gets the throw at the resultant
 lineout.
- If the ball is "taken back" into the attacking team's half, they cannot be awarded the resultant lineout in the 50/22 law unless a phase of play takes place (maul/tackle or ruck) and after which the kick is made.
